The Perfect Gift

Last month, I ran into my son's 4/5s Teacher from the previous school year. As we were talking about schools, she said Mountain School is a gift. I started thinking about gifts, how can you not especially during this gift-laden time of year. Gifts... my mind starts racing, oh my god I haven't started shopping yet... what should that special gift be for my 5 year old (Dylan) and 2 year old (Aidan)?

The childhood gifts I remember are the annual night-gowns my mother sewed for my sisters and me; going to Oma's house where she hung apples and oranges in the Christmas tree along with real candles lit long enough for us to sing Silent Night in German; and playing with my cousins in the nooks and crannies of the house where the grown ups wouldn't go. Gifts, gifts, gifts... I wish I could wrap up Mountain School and put it under the tree for my nieces, nephew, and friend's children. Yes, Mountain School is a gift that has given to my family so many times over the last three years.

Mountain School Gift #1 – Reminding me at the December circle meetings that the traditions I start with my children are more important than the gifts they open. No candles in our tree, but we made and decorated a gingerbread house, visited the house in Sunnyvale with the dueling banjo lights, attended the Tech Museum Pajama Party in our pajamas, and had everyone over to our house on Christmas day. Traditions.

Mountain School Gift # 2 – Teachers that love and nurture Dylan through his developmental stages; whatever they may be at the time. Last year, the first day back at the Red School House, Dylan was getting reacquainted with the play structure and frustrated that other children were doing the same. He accidentally hit one friend,

who cried, then Dylan cried and then Dylan hit him again, and then seemed to go through the play yard and hit most of the other children. Teacher Laura took him aside and Teachers Joan and Cindy took care of the rest, and they started the process of teaching Dylan to find the words to express himself and not use his fists. It was a year long, loving process.

Mountain School Gift #3 – Self-confidence. Two years ago, during the Saturday 2s class Dylan would throw rocks into the creek and look at the bunny hill, but would not go in or climb it. He is contemplative, and would not risk falling. Now two years later, he climbs the rocks to get to the best part of the creek, climbs the bunny hill 20 times in one day (a Dylan record Teacher Charlotte said), and this week went sledding for the first time and confidently went down areas I wasn't sure I would go.

Mountain School Gift #4 – Time. Just one day a week, I slow down from my full-time work and home schedule and watch my child. I just watch, and sometimes I cry too. What a beautiful place and time to be.

Mountain School Gift #5 – This is the last one that I will list (but there are so many more), I have to say, our Mountain School families. They include the children in our carpools that have become the best-best friend; the parents who work so hard volunteering their personal time to take care of the running of the school, and the parents and teachers who work so hard each school day. The parents help provide that safe environment that has fostered my family's imagination, creativity and self-confidence; and they do some great cooking projects too.

My perfect gift - yesterday, Dylan came with me to work and ate lunch with my coworkers. One of them politely asked, "Dylan can you read yet?" He said "No, I can't read." She continued in a sweeter, but louder voice,

FREE ELECTRONIC WASTE RECYCLING EVENT

Saturday, February 9th from 9AM – 3PM

Do you have a box, garage, basement, or attic full of electronic equipment you'd love to get rid of? Then mark your calendars for a free electronic waste recycling event sponsored by Mountain School and managed by Earth Care Recycling. The event will take place on Saturday, February 9th from 9AM – 3PM at the Akeena Solar parking lot on the corner of Los Gatos Boulevard and Blossom Hill Road.

Accepted items include televisions; monitors; battery-powered plastic toys, desktop and laptop computers; CPUs; hard drives; RAM chips; CD, DVD, zip, and floppy drives; printers; ink and toner cartridges; power supplies; sound, video, network, and modem cards; PDA's; scanners; UPS' and their batteries; mice; keyboards; computer speakers; motherboards; palm accessories; stereos; speakers; amps; Mp3 players; radios; boom boxes; copiers; fax machines; VCRs; DVD players; telephones; cell phones; pagers; cameras; wires; cables; paper shredders; electronic staplers and pencil sharpeners; power tools; typewriters; satellite dishes and receivers; microwaves; toasters; toaster ovens; electric can openers, toothbrushes, and shavers; blow dryers; curling irons; vacuum cleaners; sewing machines; clocks; fans; and waffle makers.

Earth Care Recycling offers free erasing of your hard drives using software that wipes the drives completely clean. Hard drives are then shredded down to quarter size pieces during the actual recycling process.

Please be sure to gather up as many televisions and monitors you can find since these items will raise the most funds for our school.

Items not accepted are fluorescent bulbs, household batteries, large appliances, car batteries, or anything with motor oil. Feel free to contact Earth Care Recycling at (408) 943-9943 or check out their website at www.earthcarerecycling.com if you have a question about whether

or not an item will be accepted.

Earthcare Recycling works closely with ECS Refining (www.ecsrefining.com), the company that will do the actual recycling of the items collected at our event. ECS Refining has been named one of the few companies to actually keep all items from landfills, and they will not send items overseas. You can find out more about the philosophy that ECS Refining subscribes to at www.ban.org and www.svtc.org.

Please help spread the word about this great event for the environment and our school. If you work for a company that has computer and electronic equipment it wants to get rid of, please contact me. Earth Care Recycling will pick up e-waste at any company 1-2 weeks before the event and 1 week after for free. The company donating just needs to tell Earth Care Recycling to donate proceeds to LGSONS.

I could also use help with forwarding information about the event to your friends and family as well as disseminating flyers around town. The more people who know about and participate in this event, the more we can help keep e-waste out of our landfills, teach our children the importance of recycling, and earn funds for Mountain School. Please contact me if you want to pitch in with the marketing of this event.

So come by, drop off e-waste taking up space in your home or business, and leave green.

If a check is returned a second time, there is an additional \$15 charge. Healthy Happy Kids – Family Nutrition Made Simple

Speaker: Bernadette Frager, RN, MN

Come and learn about the state of our health as a nation and how we can be sure to find the best sources of nutrition for both adults and children.

Bernadette Frager, RN, MN, will tell us about “good” carbohydrates, fats, and proteins, and the importance of fruits and vegetables. Dear Families,

I hope you've thoroughly enjoyed this holiday season and experienced special times with your families and friends. My favorite two days were both spent exploring the beach and tide pools during an extremely low tide at Natural Bridges State Park in Santa Cruz. After spending Friday afternoon, December 21st, there with the 4/5s class, I returned the next day with my husband and four grandchildren for another glorious adventure looking for sea anemones and crabs and urchins and all the wondrous inhabitants of our central coast. If you haven't ever experienced this special place don't miss the next low tides which occur during daylight hours: January 17th – 21st; February 2nd – 7th; February 16th -21st. You can find the exact times online by googling “Monterey Bay Tide Tables”. Give me a call if you'd like more specific information or check at the visitor center at the park. With young children you need two adults to maneuver the ups and downs of the rocks and cliffs but it is definitely worth all the scrambling and you will all love this exciting experience.



I'm very sorry to report that “Cinnamon”, one of our school guinea pigs died at the beginning of our school break. The Cockcroft family, our animal caretakers this year, found her dead in the cage when they arrived to take them home for the holidays. We think she was about 4 years old which is a normal life span for guinea pigs. Nico Cockcroft's 3/4s class will be able to bury her in the woods below the chicken coop and all the classes can help decorate her grave. Though Cinnamon will certainly be missed and mourned by everyone, the teachers also appreciate the opportunity for the children to experience the death of an animal at school. Children learn about life and death through concrete experiences. And because we know that eventually we all will have some experience of human death it is wonderful to be able to learn first through the death of a pet or another familiar animal.

We welcome the children's sadness and also their very matter-of-fact questions. It is a good opportunity for you to read a few books to your child about this topic which will encourage your conversations at home. We have several books at school that you can preview or children's librarians can also suggest simple, appropriate stories about death. Big, heavy topics like this aren't so big to children but just another part of life. So if we take our cues from them, Cinnamon's death can become a very interesting and valuable lesson. In fact, the liveliest discussion that my class has had all year was about the death of a pet chicken in a story about traveling by wagon train to California. So, if you should find a dead mouse, or fish, or lizard or chicken, you'll be ready to celebrate its life and discuss its decomposition.

1 cup salt

2 Tbs. cream of tartar

4 Tbs. oil

2 cups hot water (add natural food coloring to it)

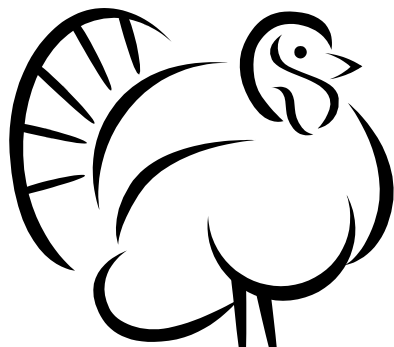

Two group sites are reserved at Portola Redwood State Park on May 9th and 10th, 2008, for families in our school who wish to go camping together. I recently went to the San Jose Art Museum in downtown San Jose. There was one exhibit that I think is especially appropriate for young children. It is "Joan Miro: Fantastic Universe" (through February 2, 2008).

Joan Miro was one of the most influential artists of the 20th century. He used memories and childhood experiences to express whimsical imagery through shapes and forms of the natural world and the cosmos. (He was influenced by the Surrealists; but refused to identify himself with any one movement.)

The exhibit showcases about sixty original prints that feature drawn lines, curlicues, geometric shapes and bold primary colors. In addition to the exhibit, there is a children's table and chairs with colors and shapes that can be arranged on a palette. It is a wonderful chance for children to explore color and manipulate shapes. The children I observed "playing" at the table were totally engrossed and animated.

I suggest a few guidelines for taking young children to any Art Museum.

- Talk about it ahead of time.
- Limit the time (and/or number of exhibits) in the Museum.
- Be sensitive to your children's pace - they are active and like to move!

Here are some questions that might help them focus on the exhibits.

- What do you see (shapes, patterns, color)?
- How does it make you feel?
- Does it remind you of something else?
- If you were in the painting, where would you sit?
- What would you see, do, feel?
- Do you think there is a story in the artwork?
- What is the artist trying to show us?



I love taking the light rail from the Winchester Station down to the Convention Center and then walking to the Museum (and other points downtown). It is a great outing!
